'BAYWATCH' - THE ORNITHOLOGICAL VERSION!

Last Easter I visited San Francisco and the Bay area of Northern California. My base, for the stay, was a penthouse above St Phillip's School in the Noe Valley district. This proved to be an ideal base for some top class birdwatching. Red-tailed hawks circled overhead regularly and on several occasions parties of cedar waxwings passed through. A male Hooded oriole provided a blaze of colour one morning and a noisy party of feral yellow headed parrots flew overhead on several afternoons. In marked contrast flowering shrubs attracted several Anna's hummingbirds and along the footpaths of urban San Francisco Brewers blackbirds were very common. Mocking birds and Morning doves were ubiquitous. Several visits to Fisherman's Wharf produced parties of brown pelicans. In the world of gulls Western and California gulls were very plentiful as were ring billed and glaucous winged. Heermann's gulls were scarce - they are summer visitors which winter in Baja on the Mexican border but I did manage to connect with two juvenile birds. Other bird species I observed in the Fisherman's Wharf area were double crested cormorant, western grebe and, offshore, large rafts of Surf scoter and the occasional Piaeon auillemot.

A visit to the Marin Headlands across the Golden Gate Bridge produced several *Turkey vultures*, which glided majestically overhead, a raft of up to 2000 *Western grebes* offshore and two *black oystercatchers* foraging along the rocky shoreline.

This is only a fraction of the avian wonders this fabulous area of California has to offer the visiting birdwatcher.

IRISH RARE BREEDING BIRDS PANEL

NOTEBOOKS & LISTS - A PERSONAL VIEW

It has long been accepted by birdwatchers that your three essentials for birdwatching are - binoculars, notebook and bird guide. Of these three essentials previous generations of birdwatchers set huge store on the field notebook - it was their absolute bible - more important than binoculars or field guide. In an era of poor binoculars, pretty awful telescopes and hit and miss bird guides, sketching and careful notes were essential. Nowadays with the benefits of superb optics and excellent pocket field guides, making possible immediate identification, we seem to set far less store on notebooks. Likewise listing is nowadays often confined to noting rarities or transcribing counts on to special pre-printed forms for surveys, for example the complex form used on the Countryside Bird Survey. Up until the recent years my own experience with notebooks was, I regret to say, very hit and miss. I always had a notebook of some kind but quite often it was not to hand at the vital moment so sightings or lists often ended up on scraps of paper, backs of envelopes or whatever was to hand. About four years ago I remedied this by attaching one of those travel document pouches to the straps of my binoculars. These can be bought cheaply at any outdoor pursuits shop. Into this fits an inexpensive standard notebook - I am now on my fourth such one! On every outing or holiday trip I keep a species-seen list. Of course, once off rarities are also entered. However, writing up a species list gives added enjoyment to even the most casual outing or country walk. You reach the stage when seeing a hitherto missed wren or dunnock is a minor triumph! Overall the build up of records becomes full of interest. On one date are your birds seen on a walk along Nimmo's Pier - a few days later you have your bird list for perhaps a distant overseas holiday destination followed by those for that trip to Belmullet!

So the purpose of this short article is to illustrate how adopting a simple 'always at hand' standard notebook can add immeasurably to your birdwatching enjoyment.
