THOUGHT FROM THE CHAIR

Spring migration always causes a bit of a stir in the branch. We listen for the cuckoo and the chiffchaff, watch for the various members of the swallow family the return and keep the telephone lines buzzing with reports of 'firsts'. We don't usually report last sightings, except in passing, and soon our attention turns to the autumn migrants expected to return to Galway over the next couple of months

NAMIB ADVENTURE

Early last March I was lucky enough to be able to take a week's trip to Namibia. Our small group was met by our guide Ben at Windhoek airport, from whence we travelled directly by road to Etosha National Park. The jewel of Namibia's parks, it is centred on a vast white saltpan that we had seen from the air on arrival. The trip was supposed to be under canvas, but the heavens opened just as we arrived at camp, pouring about an inch of rain in about half an hour, and prompting wimps like myself to rent a chalet for the first night.

We saw a variety of antelope, together with Zebra, Giraffe, Warthog and other mammals. The park is mainly arid bush, with permanent waterholes that attract wildlife. Unfortunately, rain such as we had experienced allows many grazers to avoid these potential predator ambush sites; thus they were not as productive as hoped. Birdlife is very varied with many of the birds that one would expect in dry climes, e.g. Sandgrouse, Ostrich and Bustard. The latter were common with 4 species seen, including the Black Korhaan and the Kori (reputedly the world's heaviest flying bird). Raptors were well represented, with Pale Chanting Goshawk being the commonest and most approachable. Small eagles were very much in evidence and I was able to identify Wahlberg's, Booted and Lesser Spotted amongst all the others that I couldn't!

Although we know that many summer migrants winter in Africa, it was striking to see birds from home in such different surroundings. There were Ruff, Curlew Sandpiper and Blacknecked Grebe on a lagoon, Swift and Swallow everywhere and European Nightjar hawking for moths at a floodlit waterhole where Sand Martins were roosting in the reeds.

The last few days were spent further south in the Namib Desert. Although wildlife was not as numerous here as at Etosha, it is worth visiting for the scenery alone. Local birds included Ostrich, more Bustards and Raptors and a bewildering variety of brown Larks and Chats. We visited the famous Namib dune fields, which consist of hundreds of high, Sahara-like dunes blown in from the coast. Part of the experience were the famous dew-collecting dune beetles and the Dune Lizard, which TV viewers may have seen lifting alternate legs of the hot sand during the day. Memorably, on a desert walk to a dried-up pan (or vlei), we stopped beneath a Camel Thorn tree and, looking up, saw a wonderful Spotted Eagle Owl sitting just a few yards above

Namibia is a vast country and cannot be 'done' in just one short visit; I hope to return to do the things it wasn't possible to fit in. There is no political instability (long may this remain so) and tourist facilities and infrastructure are modern and efficient. I would heartily recommend a visit. Favourite birds: Bee-eater and Spotted Eagle Owl. Favourite mammal: Cheetah. Favourite memory: looking at thousands of stars while listening to Lions roaring.
