### **Grey Heron**

It's time to go when the dark is gathering over the lagoon, although you'd still stalk

as far as Rinneanna after geese and other secrets, with just a bird book and a one-track mind.

Why not end the day as the bat starts, with home, and the lure of kind?

When the wind rises through the reedmace, and the heron shrieks in the cold, you know it's time to go.

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### RING OUZEL

From late September blackbirds of all shades have been whizzing in and out of the garden, stripping berries. I wasn't paying much heed, other than counting them. That changed on Sunday, 24<sup>th</sup> October, 2004 – the binoculars are nowadays hardly ever off them!

About 10 a.m., one perched on a branch about 20 feet away, facing me. I was in the conservatory. It was brownish, but what caught my eye was a distinct paler crescent on the breast. A Ring Ouzel? For roughly two minutes I had a good look with binoculars before deciding to photograph it. As I moved towards the door the bird flew out of camera range. I could see it, and its crescent, clearly for a couple of minutes before it went deeper into trees

I rang some BirdWatch colleagues and trawled my books. The bird was most likely a first winter male Ring Ouzel, (Collins). Tim Griffin arrived within minutes, but the bird had flown. I haven't seen it since.

### **FAVOURITE BIRDS - A NEW SERIES**

Of all birds the nightjar is a firm favourite of mine although I have in fact never managed to see or hear it. It is not for the want of trying. I recall midnight excursions up the Slieve Bloom mountains with Ger Duane armed with a tape lure. Another occasion had me pacing through a pitch black Cloosh Wood, with Tony Whilde and some others, being eaten alive by midges, and trying to persuade Tony that the numerous calling grasshopper warblers *might* be nightjars! Good ornithologist that he was he would have none of it!

There is good reason for my failure. Whilde, Hutchinson and Ruttledge in their various publications speak of decline and scarcity especially west of the Shannon. The annual *Irish Birds* systematic list rarely contains more than two or three confirmed nightjar reports. So you have to be either very lucky or, as the school reports of long ago would have said, 'should try harder'!

So what about the nightjar? It is a scarce, secretive, nocturnal bird. It feeds on insects which it catches on the wing with its large gaping beak. The strange churring

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voice of the nightjar has many times been recorded. It is a quite astonishing sound, a rapid succession of notes all at the same pitch with a down-toned slut interrupting at intervals. Francesca Greenoak in her incomparable All the Birds of the Air has the following beautifully written description:

" Ideally the nightjar likes dry, sandy heaths with scattered trees and copses. It remains silent as dusk falls, the time when the last light is fading and the land, familiar and bright by day, takes on a dark soft-edged eeriness. The best nightjar nights are warm and windless; silent, except for the rustling of trees and a low hum of insects. The song breaks on the air with extraordinary sonority. It is directionless, seeming to come from one place, then from another (an impression enhanced by the way the birds call to each other and fly about from one singing place to another). The flight is silent, they sing only when perched on some suitable branch. Any sound you make, even along a path, echoes and crashes through the stillness between 'churrs' and sometimes the nightjar will come to investigate. Against the dim sky, the hawk-like shape can be made out, the noiseless wings tilted upwards as the bird wheels round, often accompanied by the smaller forms of the pipistrelle bats, like tiny footmen. Occasionally, a courting nightjar will 'clap' its wings in a sharp report. Then, as the night blacks out every visible object, it will be gone, suddenly, leaving you lost in the darkness."

This then is a pen picture of the nightjar. A poor substitute for experiencing the 'real thing' but nevertheless I hope my article will encourage others (and myself) to persevere in the quest of (an Irish) hearing and seeing this elusive bird.

## THOUGHT FROM THE CHAIR

As I write for the first newsletter of the new year, I find myself reflecting that the strength of an NGO like BirdWatch Ireland is its members. The Galway branch currently has about 285 paid up members. The support of all of our members is greatly valued, but the members attending indoor meetings are probably drawn from a pool of about 60 people and the number of people taking part in field trips or counts is probably 20 or 30. I wonder if any BirdWatch Galway members out there have ever considered taking a further step and becoming involved in the bird projects that the branch engages in? The branch has had input into heritage projects under the aegis of both Galway City and County Councils, including the mapping of important areas for birds. Another example is the work that started last spring for the atlas of breeding birds in Galway City. The city area covers 24 tetrads (2km by 2km squares) and members undertook to survey these individually. Evidence of possible, probable and confirmed breeding was looked for and over 40 species were recorded. Among these were Wheatear, Dipper, Barn Owl and Twite, although not all of these necessarily bred. Work is currently progressing to knock the data into the most useful form possible and it is hoped that the city will be surveyed for at least the next two summers to make the atlas as accurate and comprehensive as possible. To any members wishing to become involved in bird monitoring or mapping projects I would say "please, get in touch" because your input would be invaluable. Please, don't worry that you don't have enough knowledge, a lot of the work is not as difficult as you might think and we all have to start somewhere. Chris Peppiatt
