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The purpose of this newsletter is to give BirdWatch Galway members and supporters news and information of a local and topical nature.

THOUGHT FROM THE CHAIR

I always look forward to this time of year. Although there is always the possibility that winter will have a sting in its tail, the days are getting noticeably longer and we can look to the clocks going forward and the bright evenings. The first of the migrants will not be with us until early March; Wheatear, Chiffchaff and Sandwich Tern (even though there are small numbers of the last two species that stay in Galway for the winter). However, the resident birds like Chaffinch and Dunnock can already be heard singing for all they are worth whenever the sun comes out and the early breeders-Grey Heron ('Crane'), Raven and Crossbill- are well into their breeding seasons.

The last of the Galway Bay counts takes place on the 3rd of March: if you would like to take part, please contact us. This count is part of I-WeBS, the winter waterbird survey. which ends in March. BirdWatch Ireland also runs surveys during the summer, the Countryside Bird survey records all types of birds in selected kilometre squares between april and July. Volunteers are needed to survey squares in Co. Galway this summer. If you are interested, contact the Galway branch, or Dick Coombes at (rcoombes@birdwatchireland.ie). Finally, there has been an outbreak of the H5N1 avian 'flu at a turkey farm in England recently. However,

it has been determined that this outbreak was caused by processed poultry imported from Hungary, and was not contracted from wild birds in England. There have not been any recent confirmed cases of this strain of avian 'flu in wild birds found close to Ireland. We can only hope that this remains to be the case and that the disease does not become easily transmissible to humans

> **STRAITS OF MESSINA** 24th April - 4th May 2006

The 3.1km stretch of water between the Straits of Messina of Sicily and Calabria peninsula of mainland Italy is one of the main migration routes for manv European birds of prey each year. Species that are unable to crosslarge expanses of water because of the lack of thermals, will always stick as near to land as possible. The Tunisia – Sicily – Italy route. This offers the best option for these species wishing to migrate through centre of Mediterranean Sea. Because of its location and "tradition", large numbers of birds of prey were shot every spring on Sicily. Thanks to the efforts of a few brave locals such as Anna Giordano and volunteers, no shooting of birds of prev has occurred in recent years. So along with two other Irish birders, I volunteered at migration

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camp to act as deterrent to poachers and to monitor numbers of raptors and storks moving through during our ten-day stay. The daily routine involved heading up into one of the many hills or occasionally to the coast. We would remain there from about ten in the morning until six or so in the evening, counting everything that passed our position. It was often quite cold and usually very windy in the mountains, not what one would expect for the middle of the Mediterranean Sea. Along with a fair number of Italians there were also Spanish, English, Maltese (they still have a serious shooting problem), Swedish and Finnish volunteers also present at the camp. It was a great experience to get to grips with some of the more southerly species of raptors, which I hadn't seen in Sweden the previous autumn.

The most numerous raptors were of course the Honey Buzzards. On one particular day we had 3,000 moving through in two hours, an amazing sight. Some of the birds were extremely low on some occasions as they battled up the mountainsides. It was easy to see how poachers could pick them off with ease from their concrete bunkers (very macho). Other common species moving through were Marsh Harriers. Black Kites. and Eurasian Kestrels Red-footed Falcons, the last species being new for me. Some of the scarcer species included Egyptian & Griffon Vulture, Short-toed, Booted & Golden Eagle, Pallid Harrier, "Steppe" & Long-legged Buzzard, Lesser Kestrel and Eleonora's Falcon.

While out each day local breeding and migrant species were of course seen. Cetti's, Fan-tailed and Sardinian Warblers and Serins seem to be absolutely everywhere we went. Some other more notable species (mostly ticks for me) were Cory's, Levantine's Shearwater, Rock Partridge (of the endemic whitakeri race), Kentish Plover, Auduoin's Gulls (couldn't forget the gulls!), Gull-billed Tern, Scops Owl (heard only), Alpine & Pallid Swifts, Bee-eaters, Eurasian Hoopoe, Short-toed & Crested Lark, Tawny & Red-throated Pipit, Black-eared Wheatear, Dartford

Warbler, Short-toed Treecreeper, Spotless Starling, Cirl & Rock Bunting.

On 28th April we had a day trip out to Vulcano Island, which still has an active volcano. When we arrived out there the place was alive with passerine migrants especially Whinchats. Highlights of the day were Temminck's and Little Stints together, Nightjar (flushed in broad daylight), Black-headed Wagtail, Blue Rock Thrush, Great Reed, Wood & Subalpine Warblers, Pied Flycatchers, Golden Oriole and Woodchat Shrike.

I struggled with the food at times, as I am not a great fan of cheese. Most dishes had at least one type of cheese in there somewhere of course! Most of the locals were friendly, although we did get a few strange looks from passing local expoachers!

BIRDS GALWAY AND MORE

Finally the web site is up and running. Birds Galway and More is the result of 2 years of photographs totalling over 900 photos and over 72 video clips. Why 2 years? Well since getting a Digital SLR camera for Christmas 2005, I made a commitment to my self to produce a web site to display my photos. The photos I had taken had a limited audience of my family and there is a limit to their participation in viewing the shots of birds. Now I have a world wide audience through the World Wide Web.

The equipment I use is a Konica-Minolta 7D DSLR with a 170-500mm and a 70-300 lens. Some of the photos and most of the video clips are taken with a Nikon Coolpix 880 attached to the Nikon Field Scope, which is known as digiscoping. I have now upgraded the Coolpix 880 to a Nikon CP4. which has improved some of the digiscoping shots and video clips. The Minolta DLSR has now taken over 6,000 photos and only about 500 of those are worth keeping. The advantage of have a digital camera is there is now no expense for film or processing and I now take photos of almost everything that moves some good and some not so good.

- I have used four different software programmes to produce the web site.
- 1. Photoshop Elements 3 for editing the photos.
- 2. Serif Webplus 10 to create the web site and structure. This programme is a drag and drop programme and no knowledge of web code required. Although some knowledge of web code is a help.
- 3. JAlbum 6.5 this programme reduces the photo file sizes and forms the album structure as seen on the web site.
- 4. Coffeecup web video. This software converts the very large video files about 11mb from the Coolpix camera down to less then a mega-bit. Therefore easier to down load and view on a home computer.

My intention is to update the web site with recent photos and video clips on a weekly basis. Since going on line I have updated on 4 occasions, usually on Sunday night after the weekend roaming Galway. So make sure you revisit the site from time to time

SOME RECENT BOOKS

Currently I'm reading Tim Robinson's latest book *Connemara – listening to the wind* (Penguin Ireland). This is written in the same style as his wonderful two volume *Stones of Aran*. It covers the Connemara region centered on Roundstone. In Robinson's faultless prose it ranges seamlessly from scientific information to history to anecdote. Turning every page is an exciting thrill. It is the first of a projected trilogy on Connemara This book is a superb addition to the literature of the area

During 2006 I was kindly given a copy of Birds Britannica by Mark Cocker and Richard Maybury (Chatto and Windus) for some service rendered so to speak. This is a weighty and expensive volume certainly not one to bring on a holiday unless you want to incur an excess baggage charge! That said it is a wonderful setting out of bird lore and the kind of fascinating information not available in your ordinary bird guide. The birds are dealt with in the usual scientific order and needless to say the book is illustrated with magnificent photographs and other illustrations. An ideal book choice for а landmark birthday, anniversary or some other notable occasion.

Much more modest in price but equally worthy is William Fiennes *The Snow Geese* (Picador). The writer follows this great bird's annual migration from Texas to the tundra wilderness of Canada. To quote one review – '*The Snow Geese* is studded with constant, small perpetual triumphs' – with which I heartily agree. **NS**

NEWS

During December and January members of BirdWatch Galway and staff of the National Parks and Wildlife Service repeated the Non-estuarine Waterbird Survey we did during the winter of 1997-98. At the time 21 people took part, this time we relied on 17 people to cover the same 63 stretches of coast between Tully in north Connemara and Spiddle in the south-east. As the weather was extremely inclement during most of December and the earlier part of January it was hard to find the right conditions, both weatherwise and tide-wise, to get the counts done. As a result we had to call in help from two counters working for the national coordinator of the project, Helen Boland, to cover four stretches we didn't manage to get to. Their input is, of course, gratefully acknowledged. As is the tremendous effort of the hardy core of branch members who got out there in mostly wet, windy and cold conditions to do what had to be done. Hopefully, the final tally will show the kind of results which make such an exercise worthwhile. The most obvious springing to mind would be the status of the Little Egret. We saw only one of these during the earlier survey while this time the numbers may well be in double figures. But, as not all forms have come back vet. a further analysis of the results will have to wait till the next Newsletter.
